Our Stewardship Message (March 2016)



Lent is a season of repentance. Repentance is turning away from sin, while we turn toward God for the forgiveness of sins. During Lent, we hear the Word of God and consider our lives in light of it. We confess our failures, and receive absolution, that is, forgiveness, and then commit ourselves to do better.

What does God say about giving to the Church? The Bible tells us. Our giving should be first fruits giving. (*Genesis 4:4; Proverbs 3:9*) Our giving should be regular, on the first day of week, which has the Divine Service in mind.(1 *Cor.* 6:1–2) Our giving should be proportional: according to our income (1 *Cor.* 16:1–2), according to what we have been given (2 *Cor.* 8:12; Luke 12:48), our giving should

be given with a spirit of eagerness and enthusiasm (2 Cor. 9:2), generosity and liberality(2 Cor.8:20), and cheerfully without compulsion. (2 Cor. 9:7) Our giving should be directed to those who teach us (Galatians 6:6–7) because a laborer is worthy of his hire, and we all know the going rate of such laborers in our communities.(Luke 10:7; 1 Timothy 5:18)

Now consider your own giving in light of the Bible's teaching. Are you giving of your first fruits, taking it out of your paycheck first, or does God get what's left over? Are you giving voluntarily and cheerfully? Are you giving proportionally and generously? Are you giving with eagerness and enthusiasm? Are you giving to your local congregation, sharing all good things with the one who teaches you? If your answer to any of these is "No," then repent. Turn away from your sin and toward God for forgiveness. Confess your failure. Receive absolution. And commit to do better. We know that the Spirit is willing but our flesh is weak. We believe, and we pray that God, through Word and Sacrament, would help our unbelief, our lack of trust in His ability to provide.

And this is precisely what God promises. This is what St. Paul wrote to the Church in Corinth: "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each one must give as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, "He has distributed freely, He has given to the poor; His righteousness endures forever." He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way for all your generosity, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God". (2 Cor. 9:6–15)

St. Paul tells us that the Lord of all will both supply and increase what you need to give to the church for its work in and for the world. He tells us that this work that God is doing in us will enrich and bless us in every way and through this it will produce thanksgiving to God. Everyone benefits. We will be blessed in our giving, and it will produce thanksgiving to God in those who receive it.

Giving to the church is not a burden, just like all of God's teaching. (1 John 5:2–4) They are not a burden because of He who gives it: the God who loves us and gave His only Son to die so that we may live. He loved us in that He sent His Son, born of a woman, born under the law to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption as sons. . . . So we are no longer slaves, but sons, and if a son, then an heir through God. (Galatians 4:4–5, 7) We are heirs. We receive the full rights of sons, a status that Christ our Lord achieved for us by His death, resurrection, and ascension.

So we strive to do what He asks because we are His children. And when we don't, we repent. We confess our sins. We receive absolution. We desire to do better, praying that God would work in us both to will and to do according to His good pleasure. (*Philippians 2:13*)

Dear Family in Christ:

Greetings in Christ and *Happy Easter – He is Risen*! As I reviewed various resources for an appropriate topic to share with you this month, I kept coming back to the following article written by the President of our synod. In light of who we are as God's people and our *Witness* in the world, I trust this message will strengthen all of us as we boldly take a stand for God's Word in a world of increasing darkness and despair.

How Shall We Regard the Bible?

HOW SHALL CHRISTIANS understand the Bible? The common narratives of Western culture are evaporating, especially knowledge of the Bible. Someone told me recently she was ordering a cake and wanted it decorated with a depiction of Noah's Ark. The clerk had no idea what she was talking about.

Christians may still have a modicum of familiarity with the Bible, but today we ought to be very clear about what the Bible is and teaches so we are not swept away by the cesspool of biblical ignorance. (i.e. pop culture, pop religion, pop psychology)

Agnosticism is more popular than ever. It's the faddish pseudo-religion that asserts in absolute terms (ironically) that we can't make any absolute assertions about "God" or religion. Behind the masquerade of a religiously uncommitted "high ground" – claiming all religion is the same, etc. – lurks a chasm of ignorance about what the Bible and genuine Christianity teach.

The best place for us to get hold of what the Bible is and how to understand it is found in Jesus Himself. How does Jesus regard the Bible?

- 1. The Bible is about Jesus. Jesus cajoled His contemporaries who read the Bible but missed the point. "You search the Scriptures because you think that in them you have eternal life; and it is they that bear witness about Me". (John 5:39) On the road to Emmaus, Jesus said, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into His glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, He interpreted to them in all the Scriptures those things concerning Himself". (Luke 24:26-27)
- **2.** The Old Testament contains many prophecies about Christ: "Everything written about Me in the Law of Moses and the prophets and the Psalms must be fulfilled". Then He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be proclaimed in His name to all nations". (**Luke 24:44-47**)

- **3.** The New Testament, especially the Gospels, is the accurate record of Jesus' life, death, resurrection and teaching, written by the power of the Holy Spirit. "These things I have spoken to you while I am still with you. But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things"
- **4.** Jesus regards what is written in the Old Testament as true. "Have you never read what David did . . . "? (**Mark 2:25**) Jesus regards Adam, Eve, Jonah, Moses, etc., as actual people and events. (**Matt. 19:4**; **19:8**)
- **5.** Jesus believes that the writers of the Old Testament were inspired by the Holy Spirit. "David himself, in the Holy Spirit, declared, "The Lord said to my Lord." (**Mark 12:36**) His apostles had the same belief. (**Acts 4:25**)
- **6.** Jesus regards the Bible as the Word of God and authoritative. "For truly, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not an iota, not a dot, will pass from the Law until all is accomplished". (**Matt.5:18**)
- 7. Jesus believes that the commandments of the Old Testament are God's own. "You leave the commandment of God and hold to the tradition of men." (Mark 7:8)
- **8.** Jesus regards the Scriptures as the Word of God that cannot be contravened, questioned or trumped by human authority or reason. "Scripture cannot be broken." (**John 10:35**)
- 9. Jesus understands the Bible according to Law and Gospel (i.e., God's commands and gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation), which point to Him as Savior. He piles on the Law when someone thinks the point of the Bible is works righteousness (Matt. 19:16) but also tells His disciples that His reason for existence is not "to be served, but to serve and give His life as a ransom for many." (Matt. 20:28) Anyone who comes to Jesus empty-handed, begging for mercy, always goes away forgiven, healed, comforted! (Mark 1:40; 2:1; 5:21; 7:24) See Jesus' story of the Pharisee and the tax collector (Luke 18:9) and then that of the rich young ruler (Luke 18:18) Jesus told the first "to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and treated others with contempt. (Luke 18:9) They'd missed the whole point of the Bible and Jesus!

A criticism of our teaching on the inerrancy and authority of the Bible is that we firs must convince people of the Bible's authority and only then can the Gospel of forgiveness in Christ be shared and believed. Actually, it's the opposite. The message of damnable sin and complete forgiveness in the cross and resurrection of Jesus creates faith in Jesus. Such faith recognizes the voice of the Good Shepherd in the Scriptures: "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me." (John 10:27) As sheep pre-cious to the Savior, we recognize the Bible to be what Jesus did: the very Word of God. "Long ago, at many times and in many ways, God spoke to our fathers by the prophets, but in these last days He has spoken to us by His Son." (Heb. 1:1)
