HOPE IN THE LORD

Psalm 130: 5-8

Waiting is different for everyone. For some, waiting is never easy. For others, waiting is no trouble at all. In our Psalm verses, the writer is waiting for something very important. He doesn't say it's easy waiting, he doesn't say it's hard waiting either

Psalm 130: 5-8 says, "I wait for the Lord, my soul waits, and in his word I put my hope. My soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen wait for the morning. O Israel, put your hope in the Lord, for with the Lord is unfailing love and with him is full redemption. He himself will redeem Israel from all their sins."

The writer of the psalm tells us he is waiting for the Lord. The writer compares his waiting to the watchmen who would sit on top of city walls and keep their eyes open for trouble. That may have been long, hard waiting for them. However, they knew that once morning came, the trouble that night can bring would be long behind them. Just as these watchmen waited for the peace and comfort from the morning, so the writer waited for the peace and comfort that comes from the Lord.

We have that same peace and comfort. It is peace and comfort that comes from something the psalm writer called "full redemption." When we are redeemed, we are ransomed, or bought back, from the evil that once had hold of us. Because we are redeemed, we know our sins are forgiven. That brings peace and comfort. The devil no longer has hold of us.

Is this redemption something that we will have someday, but do not have yet? This redemption and forgiveness is ours now! They became ours when Jesus suffered, died, and rose again. Our waiting is over, and we now have sure hope of life forever in heaven.

John has begun varied duties in Africa. He has visited Seminary students from eight countries at the Center for Theological Studies in Togo. There they partner with LCMS medical and mercy missions to feed both body and soul. He has also worked with LCMS agricultural missionaries to explore establishing a mission station in Turkana County, one of the poorest counties in Kenya. Sean has joined him to help here, and even worshipped in a stick and grass church.

Eagerly awaited was the opening of the Project 24 site at Lenkinshon, a Christ-centered refuge for orphans in southern Kenya, which provides food, shelter, and education for up to 80 children. John has also visited the Matongo Theological Seminary in east Africa, where three LCMS missionaries serve.

The Wolf Pack has enjoyed a camping trip in the Aberdare Highlands at over 9000 feet elevation. They work up to a 39 degree temperature. They continue to ask for your prayers and thank you for your support.

Our Stewardship Message (May 2017)



"It is more blessed to give than to receive," said St. Paul, quoting our Lord (Acts 20:35). How can this be?

Jesus and His disciples withdrew to a mountain by the shore of the Sea of Galilee. The crowds followed them, for the Lord had just showered upon them the gift of His teaching, the gift of His Word. But the day was waning; the sun was setting, and it was getting late. Looking upon the crowds, Jesus had compassion on them and asked, "Where are we to buy bread, so that these

people may eat" (John 6:5)? Philip said that two hundred denarii (a day's wages for two hundred men) could not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.

But Andrew, Peter's brother, brought a young boy forward, who had five barley loaves and two small fish. "But," Andrew asked, "what are they for so many" (John 6:9). Jesus replied, "Have the people sit down" (John 6:10).

Then Jesus, the Son of God, gave them a second gift, a gift from what only He could give—a gift from above. He took the bread and the fish, gave thanks, blessed them, and distributed them to the crowd. Then came the miracle. As these five loaves and two fish were given out, they multiplied. He fed the hungry crowd until they were all full. And twelve baskets full were left over.

But Jesus was not the only one who gave that day. There is one person who also gave from what he had. It was the boy with the five loaves and the two fish. All the others, including the boy, received the gift of a miraculous feast. And they would look back on it with wonder. But the boy, when he would look back on it, would look back and remember not just what he received. He would look back with wonder and delight when the Son of God made his gift into something miraculous. For it is more blessed to give than to receive.

This our Lord does for each of us. He presses our gifts, no matter how big or how small, into His service and works wonders with them. He provides through what we give: water for baptism, bread and wine for the Lord's Supper, a man called and sent for the preaching of the Gospel and Absolution. He provides a building in which we can gather as His children, lights so that we might not gather in darkness. He provides funds for the care of the poor and struggling, for missionaries who preach and teach beyond our borders. He makes Christians, disciples of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in our midst by bringing them to faith and nurturing them in that faith. He takes our gifts and turns them into something miraculous.

*I*ndeed, it is more blessed to give than to receive. Thus we give. We give of what we have. And the Lord works His wonders.

We are "Consecrated Stewards" to the Glory of God!
