2018: A Year of Marriage OCTOBER: Being the Light of the World



As we continue our year-long treatment of the subject of marriage, this month I want to look at the state of sexual morality in our country and the condition of marriage, and to encourage us as Christians to be light in this very dark world. We can do this by our example, and even more importantly, by proclaiming the Gospel of the forgiveness of sins. Meanwhile and always, we ought to pray.

One of the sad realities about our beloved country is that we have become a sexually permissive and indeed sexually perverted land. And perhaps the saddest part of all is that so large a segment of our population does not see this, but on the contrary celebrates what they believe to be progress. We have taught young people to shed all inhibitions about their sexuality. They now explore and experiment openly, as a normal part of adolescence. And this is considered "progress". The "antiquated" idea has been put away that a man and a woman should be united in an exclusive union for life. Sexual unions can now take place whenever our fickle and selfish natures desire. And this is progress? The "enjoyment" of pornography is increasingly regarded as harmless. And this is progress? The definition of marriage as only a male-female union has since Obergefell v. Hodges (Supreme Court decision of 2015) been replaced with a broader definition that includes same-sex unions. And this is progress?

In fact, all of the above represent neither improvement nor progress but a downward slide toward a pit of depravity. God designed marriage to be the foundation of a strong society, providing the secure and loving environment within which children, under the care and direction of their father and mother, can thrive as they are taught about God. Our society is crumbling, and it is not hard for the perceptive observer to see why. We have attacked the foundation! We have assaulted God's institution of marriage.

But before we fly off the handle about this situation, let's be careful where to pin the ultimate blame. Remember Paul's teaching in Ephesians 6: "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood"—that is, our ultimate enemies are not our fellow man—"but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places"—that is, our ultimate enemy, and the true instigator of all the moral depravity and perversity in our land, is the devil, with his evil angels.

So what should we do? We should turn to God for help. We should above all pray, asking God to frustrate the evil plans and purposes of the devil. "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven" becomes a powerful prayer for such a time as this. Likewise the petition "Deliver us from evil." The petition "Give us this day our daily bread" helps us to acknowledge the good marriages among us to be gifts from God. And, the petition that God forgive our trespasses—well, it hardly needs to be mentioned that each of us shares in the guilt of having sinned in various ways against God's gifts of sexuality and marriage. So, through the Lord's Prayer we learn to have humble and repentant attitudes, without which our voices in society will sound like nothing but holier-than-thou, loveless rants.

You see, here's the key thing: At the center of this whole discussion about sex lies the (only) pure and holy One, God's own Son, Jesus Christ. He of all people would have had the right to summarily condemn our whole depraved human race. However, "God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved" (John 3:17). Jesus came to earth, in love, to offer His pure and holy flesh and blood as the sacrifice to make us all righteous before His Father—all of us, including and especially the people of our day. However immorally we have thought, spoken, or behaved, "there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1). Repentance and forgiveness of sins is proclaimed in Jesus' name today! The comfort of being right with God purely through faith in His Son, that comfort is mine, it is yours, it is ours!

And that is the most important way for us to shine as lights in this dark world today. Knowing the Gospel of the forgiveness of sins, we share it. How we and all the people need it! Those whom God brings to see the emptiness and deep sadness of a sexually immoral life, those people God will also invite to experience the newness of life that comes through His forgiveness and grace in Christ as we come alongside them to share the Gospel. God grant it!

And empowered by the Holy Spirit we lights of the world also shine as we live out the will of God and keep His commandments. There is a dramatic contrast between the speech and conduct of those who are God's children and those who are not, between those who have the Holy Spirit and those who do not. Martin Luther teaches us that the petition "Hallowed be Thy name" is a prayer that God would help us to keep teaching His Word purely and also to live holy lives according to it. By God's grace His Christian people speak respectfully, discretely, and modestly about sex. By His grace God's Christian people conduct themselves with purity, exercising self-control in matters of sex. By God's grace His Christian people live holy lives whether single or within the bond of marriage. *And in all of this the world is given a chance to see what God's good design looks like, and the joys it brings*.

Dear friends in Christ, fellow redeemed, may God help you and me, each of us according to our unique calling, to shine the Gospel light of Jesus into this world, for the good of the world—this world so deeply loved by the God who for our salvation sent His only-begotten Son (John 3:16)!

Our Stewardship Message (October 2018)

Why do we give? Is it simply because God commands us to? Or is there more to it? To be sure, the instruction and Word of God in the Bible says we should give, and this is sufficient to encourage us to give (Luke 6:38; Acts 20:35; 1 Cor. 16:2; 2 Cor. 8:7; Gal 6:6).

 \boldsymbol{B} ut there's more to it than just obligation. We're not just trying to fulfill a work of the Law. We are bearing fruits of the Spirit given to us by our Father in heaven

through His Son our Lord Jesus Christ. In other words, we're not just doing what our Father said, we're also doing what He did.

Children emulate their parents. When they grow up they often carry many of the same mannerisms and characteristics as their parents, but there is more to it than that. Children copy their parents even on a more mundane level. They watch how their parents cross their legs, how they fold their hands, how they stand and sit and walk, how they do and say most everything.

And children try to copy it, which can be quite humorous when parents wish they wouldn't. It can be uncomfortable and embarrassing if a child copies or repeats something less than polite that they learned from a parent. Sitcoms thrive on these situations. It only happens because children emulate their parents because they want to be like them.

We are the children of God, by grace, through faith. In Holy Baptism, God the Father declares of us what He declared of Jesus at His Baptism in the Jordan: "You are my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." God the Father claims us as His own. He takes away all our sins, and in exchange He gives us His righteousness, His purity, His holiness, and His Spirit, by which we cry out, "Abba, Father."

We are born again, born from above, born of water and the Spirit, to a new life in Christ as His children. We are sons of God in Christ, through Baptism. And since we are sons, we are heirs – heirs who share in the glory of the Son of God. The inheritance is ours because of the Father's grace and mercy, His generosity in sending His Son in time to save us for all eternity.

And this is why we give generously of our income to the work of the church. We want to be like our heavenly Father. We want to emulate His generosity by being generous ourselves. We give to the work of the Church because we have witnessed the generous giving of our Father in heaven.

More than that, we are recipients of it. It is because we have received God our Father's gifts that we desire to give ourselves. And His gifts are not just spiritual. They are temporal and earthly as well. As the Small Catechism teaches in the Fourth Petition of the Lord's Prayer: "Give us this day our daily bread." What does this mean? God certainly gives daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people, but we pray in this petition that God would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving. What is meant by daily bread? Daily bread includes everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, goods, a devout husband or wife, devout children, devout workers, devout and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

*I*n other words, God gives us everything we need for the care of both body and soul. His generosity knows no bounds. Therefore, we sit down at the beginning of the year, the beginning of the month, or the beginning of the week to set aside a generous portion of God's daily bread for His work in the Church.

We don't do this simply because He has commanded us so to do; it is because we, as His children by grace, want to emulate His generosity in our own lives. He is our Father; we are His children. And children want to be like their parents.

The Word of Christ vs. the Will of Man

Jesus' first words in the Gospel of Mark are the summation of everything He wants to proclaim and everything He wants us to do: "The Kingdom of God is at hand, repent, and believe the Gospel" (Mark 1:14)

In Mark 4, Jesus teaches a large crowd in parables about the kingdom of God: the Parable of the Sower (Mark 4:26-29), the Parable of the Seed Growing (Mark 4:26-29), and the Parable of the Mustard Seed (Mark 4:30-32). Our first inclination might be to think that Jesus is trying to use these parables to convince His hearers concerning the Kingdom of God. But then He tells us in Mark 4:10-12 that He has a very different reason for doing so: "so that they may indeed see but not perceive, and may indeed hear but not under- stand, lest they should turn and be forgiven."

Jesus is as good as His own parables. Just as the sower would not make a very efficient farmer (sowing without regard for the condition of the ground on which the seed falls), so too Jesus would not live up to the expectations of modern day evangelism efforts. Just as the Lord called Isaiah to preach to an unbelieving Israel who would not understand anything they heard or saw, so too Jesus teaches in parables to unbelieving crowds so that they would also not understand.

To modern wisdom concerning Christian outreach, Jesus' approach seems every bit as futile as scattering seed over thorny or rocky ground. Yet all of the seed parables that concern the Kingdom of God deliver an equally important message: Trust the Word of Christ! The sower doesn't bother to worry about the condition of the ground because the power is in the seed, the Word. Jesus teaches in parables so that those who come to believe do so not through their own understanding, but through faith given by Christ via His Word.

We need not cultivate our proclamation of the Word in order to cater to a specific demographic or cultural climate. We faithfully proclaim His Word and the good news of His Gospel and trust that Christ's Word will do as He promises. In short, Jesus doesn't call us to be innovative with the Gospel; He calls us to trust in Him and proclaim His Word faithfully. We are simply to be in His Word ourselves, hearing it proclaimed to us, receiving its gifts, and learning from it in the fellowship of our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Right now the Church's efforts in evangelism seem rather insignificant. Our temptation is to worry that the "same-old-same-old" sharing of God's Word is not effective by itself. But like the man who scatters the seed and then does nothing more than sleep and rise as it grows, we share the Gospel and rest in Christ as He does His work in the hearts of humanity, and then we rejoice in the harvest!

Jesus begins His ministry with the proclamation, "*The Kingdom of God is at hand!*" So let us repent and believe the Gospel and then pray, as He taught us, "*Thy kingdom come.*"

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"Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7)
